



"Is Global cooperation, as demonstrated at COP28, essential for effective climate action?"

The advent of industrialization, a direct result of industrial revolution has brought us face-to-face with a significant challenge: global warming. This issue, recognized globally, arises as countries continue to rely on hydrocarbons for energy and emit greenhouse gases into the atmosphere. The

global average temperature is on a steady rise, leading to the devastation of ecosystems. At a recent international summit in the UAE, COP28, 124 countries pledged to act against global warming and reduce their greenhouse gas emissions.

To combat global warming, worldwide cooperation is of paramount importance, without which attempts at resolving this issue are futile. This is because global warming is not limited to a localised area, and transcends national boundaries. Greenhouse gases affect the entirety of the atmosphere, due to their nature of trapping infrared radiation emitted from the sun. This effectively means that the actions of one nation affect the quality of life for other nations as well. A country to consider as an example is China,

which is the world leader in greenhouse gas emissions due to its highly industrialized economy. The greenhouse gases emitted by China affect air quality in Asia proximally located, like Japan and the Korean Peninsula.

Another reason why cooperation is the driving factor behind the action is that cooperation means the effective utilization of global resources. Developing countries with strained economies most certainly do not have the capital to invest in renewable energy sources, and are still powered by fossil fuels. Global Cooperation would mean resources that different countries possess are being used efficiently. Developed nations helping developing nations through monetary aid would compel them to switch to more environmentfriendly energy sources, and also alleviate the pressure to maintain feasible living conditions for the people living in these countries. This would not be possible if it weren't for cooperation between countries. In the COP28 Declaration, a total of approximately 400 million dollars was pledged towards a fund that aimed to provide aid to countries affected by climate change, by countries like the UK, USA, Japan, and members of the EU.



Public conferences like the COP28 play crucial roles in promoting cooperation as they inculcate a sense of accountability for the member nations. These conferences act as a platform for members to declare their plans and visions, and seek assistance from fellow

members as well. The members hold each other accountable and exchange aid amongst themselves. Even though the declaration signed at COP28 wasn't legally binding, it is hoped to catalyse effective action against climate change. The United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change (UNFCCC), under which the Conference of the Parties (COP) was held, requires members to report on their current progress which improves transparency as other members can assess and scrutinise the effectiveness of the work being done.

In conclusion, global cooperation is a prime factor responsible for the development and deployment of policies to combat climate change. It is crucial for countries to unite for the preservation of the unique ecosystems our planet houses, and to reduce and eventually prohibit the emission of gases responsible for global warming for the sake of a more promising future

Although global cooperation is often considered a crucial aspect of addressing climate change, it is essential to examine the potential drawbacks and alternative approaches to determine if it is truly indispensable for effective climate action. In the case of COP28, although international

> cooperation may have its merits, it is not necessarily the sole or most effective solution to addressing climate change.

One argument against global cooperation is that it can lead to inefficiencies and delays in decisionmaking. International organizations often involve lengthy negotiation processes, which may result in slow progress and missed opportunities. By contrast, individual countries can implement their policies and initiatives more swiftly, allowing for more immediate action against climate change.

Moreover, not all countries prioritize climate change as a high priority, and some may even act against the collective interest. In such cases, relying on global cooperation could be harmful to the overall progress.

For example, nations that rely heavily on fossil fuel industries may resist transitioning to clean energy or implementing strict environmental policies, hindering the global effort to combat climate change.

Furthermore, global cooperation may lead to an unequal allocation of responsibilities and resources. Developed countries, which have historically contributed more to greenhouse gas emissions, may be expected to bear a larger share of the burden in terms of financial aid and technological support for developing nations. However, this may lead to resentment and a lack of commitment from developing countries, as they feel unfairly targeted.

An alternative approach to global cooperation is regional or local collaboration. By focusing on smaller, more manageable groups, countries can work together more effectively and address regional-specific challenges. For instance, the European Union has successfully implemented policies to reduce greenhouse gas emissions and promote renewable energy sources within the region.

Additionally, individual countries can take the initiative to implement their climate change policies without waiting for global consensus. This approach allows nations to tailor their strategies to their unique circumstances and resources. For instance, China, the world's largest emitter of greenhouse gases, has invested heavily in renewable energy and set ambitious targets for reducing emissions

Relying solely on global cooperation may dilute the accountability of individual nations. When countries collaborate on a global scale, it becomes challenging to pinpoint responsibility for specific outcomes or failures. This lack of accountability may hinder the enforcement of commitments made during international agreements like COP28.

Furthermore, the diversity of geopolitical interests within global cooperation forums can lead to diluted or compromised climate policies. Countries may prioritize their national interests over collective global goals, resulting in watered-down agreements that lack the necessary stringency to address the urgency of climate change. In contrast, local or regional collaborations enable a more focused alignment of interests, facilitating the development of robust, context-specific climate strategies. This tailored approach may yield more effective and immediate results in mitigating climate change impacts.

In conclusion, while global cooperation has its merits, it is not necessarily essential for effective climate action. The potential drawbacks, such as inefficiencies, unequal distribution of responsibilities, and varying levels of commitment among nations, should be considered. Alternative approaches, like regional or local collaboration and individual country initiatives, can offer more targeted and efficient solutions to combat climate change. Ultimately, the success of any approach depends on the willingness and commitment of countries to prioritize the well-being of our planet.



We may fully engage in life as it unfolds when we live in the present. Mindfulness practices, such as meditation, help people become more aware of


how ephemeral life is by assisting them in letting go of attachments to the past and anxieties about the



Thai Mango Salad

Ingredients for salad:

- ½ cup thinly sliced onions
- ½ cup thinly sliced bell peppers of assorted colors
- ½ cup chopped spring onions
- 1/4 cup chopped coriander
- 1 thinly chopped mango
- 1/4 cup chopped mint leaves
- 12-15 crushed, dry and roasted peanuts

Ingredients for dressing:

- 1 tablespoon white vinegar
- 1 tablespoon light soy sauce
- 1 tablespoon honey
- 1 tablespoon lemon juice
- 2 tablespoons chilli paste

Optional Ingredients:

- vegetable oil
- garlic and ginger to taste
- salt to taste
- sugar to taste
- 1 tablespoon white vinegar

- 1. Mix all the ingredients of the salad, while making sure that the pieces of the mango don't fall apart.
- 2. Heat vegetable oil in a pan on medium heat.
- 3. Once the oil is hot, add in the ginger and garlic. Then saute for 30-
- Add in the chilli paste, salt, sugar and white vinegar and cook for 2-3 minutes.
- 5. Cool and store.
- Mix all the ingredients of the dressing, along with the seasoned chilli paste (optional).

Tête-à-Tête with YUKI ELLIAS

As a multi-talented artist, you have excelled in directing, acting, and producing. Which of these roles do you find the most fulfilling and any particular reason for this choice?

Excerpts from the Interview

I started as an actor, loving the stage and the audience's response. As I grew older, I focused more on creating stories, and caring less about the audience's reaction. I wanted to tell the stories I believed in. The roles I used to get bored me, so I began writing my own work and creating characters I truly wanted to play. It became less about pleasing the audience and more about my presence on stage. Producing came naturally, as theatre arts lack support in India. I had to fund my projects myself, often resulting in losses. I balanced this with my corporate work, funding my art projects. I find joy in creating and directing stories now. It's a shift from pleasing the audience to finding personal fulfilment in action.

These days people don't take an interest in watching cinemas in the theatre, and OTT has come as a swift replacement. How has it changed

Thanks to OTT, many theatre actors now have more chances to perform. Earlier, films favoured big stars, but OTT has opened doors. You don't need to be a big star to be an actor. It has expanded opportunities for many actors to showcase talent. Many friends and theatre students have found more chances and built careers via OTT. What does it do for theatre? The theatre has never competed with bigger platforms. It offers its own unique experience. I believe both will always coexist.

You've portrayed diverse characters. How do you prepare for such varied roles? Is there a particular role that has been especially challenging or rewarding for you?

The Jacques Lecoq school, where I spent my time studying theatre, emphasised embodying various characters, not just human but also abstract entities like trees swaying in the wind or olive oil. I enjoyed playing diverse roles, including animals, and indulged in transformation, relishing the freedom to abandon typical human behaviour and embrace eccentricity. Clowning elements particularly appeal to me. In "Elephant in the Room," a play I wrote, I portray nine characters, including Spider and Ganpati. Playing all these roles in one play was rewarding.

• What changes or trends do you foresee in the theatre industry, especially concerning storytelling or performance styles? How do you adapt to these changes and stay relevant in the dynamic world of theatre?

I think significant changes are coming. Initially, we always thought it's a

film that's coming, right? Because theatre's older than films. So, of course when the cameras came and then the big screens were like, oh, that's going to take, and then now it's AI, the virtual space. Will we be needed anymore? Somebody else can play our parts. You don't need human beings to play characters anymore. Jack Jibbit is already writing plays on AI-based stories. So of course, that's something that's coming, and we have to accept it and it will still be great. And I always think the live theatre space will

always continue to exist. Because like I said, we were always on the fringe and we'll still be there. Because if you do want a company experience where we're sitting like this and chatting, very different from the online chat, right? Then, so long as people still want this, theatre will be there. And it means a lot to us. It might get more interesting as well because some things that AI is doing, in the virtual space are giving us, and in some ways, it's making it easier for us to create certain things. Our shows could be very fascinating with all of that. So, I think it's exciting. Maybe some old-school theatre people will feel like no, like some of us feel we shouldn't even have projections. Like no, no AIbased work in the theatre. And some of us will be making it and we will be using it. And it could lead to some very exciting work. Well, we were just discussing AI. Why is it taking over? Writers write from the heart.

We believed we'd always own the creative story telling aspect. Imagination and emotion can't be replaced, it can only be replicated. Math and science are data driven, so it makes sense for AI to take over or at least help with analysis. Creativity is still something that we feel is unique to individuals. What I write or create can't be copied. If we don't write something ourselves, it



doesn't feel original anymore. It doesn't feel like it's yours. This is going to be an important conversation in the years to come. What is original now? And what do we put as merit? We'll see in time what happens and what we value, right? What will we start to value?

As an experienced theatre artist, what advice would you like to give to aspiring actors?

Yes, I think there's more to actors than just acting. Sometimes I think we think of it as what we like doing. But behind the actor is also a story-teller. I urge more people to push to find their voice because there's a lot of creativity. When working with directors, we sometimes have to follow rules we don't agree with, and we often don't get to work with the best directors But we put them on a pedestal, hoping for an opportunity to shine. I tell young people to carve out their own opportunities. If you're just an actor, you wait for the opportunity. But if you write your own content, you'll create opportunities for yourself and expand your abilities. Directing and producing requires skills like managing teams and deadlines, which are important to build. Sometimes actors neglect these skills because acting is easier. I always say try writing or directing. You'll learn discipline and might even discover you're a very good writer or director.

As a female actor, how do you think you can contribute towards the empowerment of women and portray it in your films?

That's great. I find myself increasingly influenced by the younger generation. Sometimes I don't identify strictly as female or male; now, terms like non-binary are becoming more accepted. I haven't fully settled into any specific identity yet. Yes, I resist conformity. I aim to challenge norms in every way possible. In the past, the term "actors" was used, but now "actor" is preferred as it's a profession open to all genders. What I love about theatre, especially when I started creating my work, is its liberating nature. I

can embody any character without conforming to gender norms. Previously, especially in India, male directors imposed gendered expectations on me. This experience made me rethink every role and script I encountered. I aspire to write not just for myself, but for all women, capturing their essence in rich, multidimensional characters. If I fall short, I hope to support and collaborate with other creatives who are pushing boundaries and challenging stereotypes. I don't claim to have all the answers; others are doing profound work, and I strive

to be an ally and continue learning. I believe the theatre offers a platform for exploration and representation beyond traditional gender roles. It's a space where I can play a man, a woman, a god, or a rock without constraints. However, I've faced challenges from male directors who imposed gendered ideals on my performances. This experience has fuelled my determination to create inclusive and diverse narratives. In my writing, I aim to transcend gender stereotypes and create characters that resonate with the human experience. Even if I fall short, I'm committed to supporting marginalised voices and amplifying their stories. I recognize that there's always more to learn, and I'm eager to evolve as an artist and advocate for inclusivity in the arts.
